

Argument

When Frederic was a little boy, his nurse, Ruth, was told to apprentice him to become a pilot. She heard the word incorrectly and apprenticed him to a band of pirates, remaining with them herself as a maid-of-all-work. Although Frederic loathed the pirate trade, he dutifully served. As the curtain rises, his indentures are almost up and he is preparing to leave the band and devote himself to the extermination of piracy.

He urges the pirates to join him, but they refuse. Ruth, however, wishes to become his wife. Having seen few women, Frederic does not know whether she is really as pretty as she says she is, but he finally consents to take her.

Just then a group of girls, all the wards of Major-General Stanley, happen upon the scene. Frederic sees their beauty-and Ruth's plainness-and renounces her. One girl, Mabel, takes a particular interest in Frederic, and he in her. The other girls are seized by the pirates and threatened with immediate marriage. When the Major-General arrives, he can dissuade the pirates only by a ruse; he tells them that he is an orphan, and so works upon their sympathies that they let him and his wards go free.

Soon, however, this lie troubles the Major-General's conscience; he sits brooding over it at night in a Gothic ruin. He is consoled by his wards' sympathy and Frederic's plan to lead a band of police against the pirates.

Meanwhile, the Pirate King and Ruth appear at the window and beckon Frederic: they have discovered that his indentures were to run until his 21st birthday, and-as he was born on February 29-he has really had only five birthdays. Out of a strong sense of duty, he immediately rejoins the pirates and tells them of the Major-General's lie. Outraged, they seek revenge.

But the police come to the rescue and charge the pirates to yield "in Queen Victoria's name." This they do. Ruth explains, however, that these men who appear to be lawless pirates are really all "noblemen who have gone wrong," and they are pardoned and permitted to marry the Major-General's wards.

The Savoyards

The success of Gilbert & Sullivan's operas prompted their business manager, Richard D'Oyly Carte, to build a theater for them in the heart of London. On the site of the ancient Savoy Palace, D'Oyly Carte built the first theater in the world to be lit by electricity. It opened on October 10, 1881, with Patience. The works of Gilbert & Sullivan are so closely associated with the theater that they are often called the Savoy Operas, and their devotees are called Savoyards.

Directors & Cast Notes

Christopher McGahan (Music Director) is Asst. Professor of Music at Bucknell University, Lewisburg, Pa., where he conducts the University Orchestra, the Chamber Singers and the Rooke Chapel Choir and is University Organist. He was on the staff of the Illinois Opera Theater and was music director of the Champaign-Urbana Unitarian-Universalist Society. He studied conducting as a Rockefeller Fellow at the Aspen Music Festival and has been a guest conductor in many parts of the country.

Michael Goldberg (Stage Director) has enjoyed a lifelong romance with the G&S operas. With Madison Savoyards he has directed (*Iolanthe*, 1979; *The Zoo*, 1980), produced (*Princess Ida*, 1980) and sat on the board of directors. He has also directed Britten's *Albert Herring* and Stravinsky's *The Rake's Progress* for the UW Opera. He holds an administrative position with the Wisconsin Union Theater.

Perry Allaire (Samuel) returns to Madison after several months of residence in Philadelphia. He is a past Vice-President of Madison Savoyards, and his stage credits with the organization include the Bos'un's Mate in H.M.S. Pinatore, Sir Despard Murgatroyd in Ruddigore, Pvt. Willis in Iolanthe and King Hildebrand in Princess Ida (1977-1980). He also prepared the chorus and played the Judge in a 1978 University League benefit performance of Trial By Jury.

Judson Harmon (Pirate King) is an evaluation consultant at the Wisconsin Dept. of Public Instruction. He has sung with the Madison Philharmonic Chorus since 1976 and is Vice-President of that organization. He sang with the Sullivan Ensemble (1970-1980) and also performs romantic duets with soprano Susan Peterson of Milwaukee. Thirty years ago, as a high school junior, he debuted as the Pirate King.

Thomas H. Murphy (Frederic) appeared as Dick Dauntless in Madison Savoyards' Ruddigore (1978). He sang the role of Mayor Upfold in the UW Opera's Albert Herring and was tenor soloist with the UW Choral Union in Beethoven's Mass in C and Schubert's Mass in E flat. He is a senior in applied voice at the UW.

Jean Sinclair (Ruth) has performed with the Florentine Opera Company, Skylight Theater (as the Duchess of Plaza-Toro in *The Gondollers*), the Bel Canto Choir, the Charles Sullivan Ensemble and the Milwaukee Opera Company. She has done solo oratorio work in Erie, Pa., Schenectady, N.Y., and most recently in Milwaukee, in Bach's B minor Mass at the Pabst Theater. She has also performed in Broadway revues at Summerfest and the Metropole Theater.

Sabena Brown (Edith) is a native Madisonian and is currently a senior at the UW working on a degree in vocal performance. She has appeared with the Wisconsin Singers and in the UW Opera's productions of House To Half and The Rake's Progress.

Julie R. Soddy (Kate) is an applied voice student at the UW working toward a Bachelor of Music degree. Most recently she sang with the UW Opera in House To Half and The Rake's Progress. In Janesville, she appeared in Music Man, 1776, Brigadoon and other productions.

Maril Johnson (Isabel) is a music education student at the UW. A native Madisonian, she has appeared in five other Savoyards productions, as well as Kiss Me Kate with the Madison Theatre Guild. She has also sung with the UW Concert Choir, Chamber Singers, Chorale and Women's Chorus, and is a member of the Beaver Dam Oratorio Society.

Ellen Kennedy (Mabel) is completing a degree in applied voice at the UW. She has sung in the University Concert Choir and with the Opera Workshop. Most recently she understudied the role of Gretel in Hansel And Gretel with Madison Civic Opera.

Patrick Joseph Linehan (Major-General), a native of Boston, has appeared with Madison Savoyards as Captain Corcoran in H.M.S. Pinatore (1977) and as the Lord Chancellor in Iolanthe (1979). He has also appeared with the University Theatre in Juno And The Paycock and The Magistrate. In his other life he is a Ph.D. candidate in political science at the UW.

John Shell (Sergeant of Police) is making his Madison debut. He is a systems programmer for Madison Gas & Electric and choir director at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Edgerton. He has appeared in many musicals with Players Unlimited in LaGrange, Ill., and in *The Mikado* and *The Magic Flute* with the Repertory Opera Theater of Oak Park, Ill.
