THE ARGUMENT

A witch curses an early Baronet of Ruddygore and all his line, dooming them to commit a crime a day, or die. Dame Hannah narrates this legend to the Chorus of Professional Bridesmaids, gathered around the cottage of Rose Maybud, a young damsel who has not yet married. Robin Oakapple, a young farmer, loves Rose, but is too shy to declare his passion. We learn that Robin is really Sir Ruthven (pronounced "Rivven") Murgatroyd, the true Baronet of Ruddygore, who has fled the Curse, leaving it to his younger brother, Despard. Robin's foster-brother, Richard Dauntless, just returned from sea, also knows Robin's identity. Learning of the deadlock in Robin's love-affair, Richard volunteers to see the lady and clear up the situation. On meeting Rose, however, he too falls in love with her, avows his love, and is accepted. But when Rose learns of Robin's love for her, she promptly transfers her affections to him.

Mad Margaret enters, and we learn that she had been in love with the present baronet, Despard. In a song, Despard reveals his infamy, as well as his attempts to atone. Richard tells him that his brother, Sir Ruthven, is alive and masquerading as Robin Oakapple. Robin enters with his promised bride to celebrate the nuptials. But the wedding is interrupted by the revelation that Robin is really the Bad Baronet. Rose offers herself to Despard, who declares that he, now a virtuous person, will be true to Margaret. So Rose once more falls back on Richard.

The second act takes place in the Picture Gallery of Ruddygore Castle, where the portraits of his ancestors look down on a sadly changed Robin. Richard and Rose dance in to ask Robin's consent to their marriage. This they obtain, with some trouble, and they depart. Robin's ancestors, stepping down from their frames, and led by his uncle Roderick, accuse him of evading the terms of the curse, and order him to do something really wicked-carry off a maiden. Robin resists, but is forced to yield. He sends his servant, Adam, to bring him a maiden at once-any maiden!

A reformed Despard and Margaret appear. They have come to implore Robin to forswear his wicked ways. He agrees, when, upon their departure, Adam enters with the "maiden." She turns out to be Dame Hannah, who proves so well able to protect herself, that Robin must call upon his uncle Roderick for help. Roderick steps down from his frame, and we lears that he and Hannah were once lovers. Robin is summarily dismissed, but soon returns to interrupt their reunion with the exciting news that he has found a loophole in the curse; to refuse to commit a crime amounts to suicide, but suicide itself is a crime. So Roderick finds himself still alive, Rose at once becomes the bride of the released Robin, Richard appropriates the head Bridesmaid, and all ends in general rejoicing.

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CAST INFORMATION

Carrie Marie Warren (Zorah)-Carrie received her degree in Religious Studies from California State University, Northridge, and is pursuing a second degree, a Bachelor of Music in vocal performance, at the U.W. Madison. She performed recently as Pallas Athena in The Coronation of Poppea, This is her first work with Gilbert and Sullivan, and with the Madison Savoyards.

Terry Kiss (Dame Hannah)-This is Terry's 6th on-stage performance with Savoyards. She has enjoyed working "behind the scenes" for an equal length of time. Terry is on the Board of Directors of Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra and serves as Director of Music for Memorial United Church of Christ, Fitchburg. She is a frequent performer and volunteer in the Madison area. Terry works for the American Cancer Society, Wisconsin Division, Inc.

Lisa Reichl (Ruth)-Lisa appears in her 3rd production with Madison Savoyards, having portrayed "Kate" in The Pirates of Penzance and "Iolanthe" in Lolanthe. She served as Music Director for the Sun Prairie Civic Theatre production of Quilters. A recent graduate in Music Education from the U.W. Madison, Lisa will reside in Waukesha and teach choral music in the Kettle Moraine School District. Lisa is Chorusmaster for this year's production of Ruddyzore.

Katrina Van Dreel (Rose Maybud) - Katrina studied with Lois Fisher at the U.W. Madison School of Music. She gave 3 recitals and competed in the NAT's competion (taking 1st place) her Sophomore, Junior and Senior years. She has performed as "Cupid" in The Coronation of Poppea and "Joanna" in Sweeney Tadd. Previous Savoyards' productions include The Pirates of Pensance and lalanthe. She is continuing her studies at the Eastman School of Music.

Daniel L. Ihasz (Robin Oakapple)-An Applied Vocal Performance graduate of the U.W. Madison School of Music, Dan has been the recipient of many awards, including a recent 4th place honor in the Metropolitan Opera District Competition. His performances have included such roles as "Antonio" in The Marriage of Figuro." Malatesta" in Don Pasquale and most recently "Anthony Hope" in Sweeney Todd. This is Dan's debut with Madison Savoyards.

Judson Harmon (Old Adam Goodheast)-Judd is employed by the Wisconsin State Department of Public Instruction. He has had numerous roles with the Savoyards, from the "Pirate King" in The Pirates of Pensance (1981) to Lord Mountararat in Lolanthe (1988). Judd has served several terms on the Board of Directors for Madison Savoyards, Ltd.

Mark J. Meier (Richard Dauntless)-Mark has performed as tenor soloist, lead performer and Music Director with many Madison arts organizations, including Madison Savoyards, Madison Opera, Mt. Horeb Theater, U.W. Choral Union, Sun Praire Civic Theatre, U.W. Opera and University Theatre. He studies voice with Diane Forlano in Chicago. When not performing, Mark works as Manager of Femrite Sales Consignment Store.

Rebecca Stidolph (Mad Margaret)-Rebecca, a native of Texas, has been a recipient of many scholarships, including those given by U.W. Opera Props and the Del Barto-Tramonte Foundation. While at East Texas State University and the U.W. Madison, she has performed such roles as "Miss Todd" in Menotti's The Old Maid and The Thief, the "Witch" in Humperdinck's Hansel & Gretel and "Bessie" in Weill's Mahozony Sangspiel. This is her Sayoyards debut.

John D. Hyland (Despard)-John appeared in Savoyards' 1988 production of lulanthe, and has performed as "Captain Corcoran" (II.M.S. Pinafore) and the "Pirate King" (The Pirates of Pensance) at Starlight Theatre, Rockford, Illinois. He has also appeared with the New American Theatre in Rockford, and at Rockford College. John is president of Madison Savoyards, Ltd.'s, 1988-1989 Board of Directors, and is an attorney with Hurley, Burish, & Milliken in Madison.

Richard Bessman (Roderick)-Richard, a Madison native, has recently returned from several years of theatre and voice study on both coasts. He has appeared in numerous cabarets and in New York productions of Night Must Fall and Jesus Christ Superstar. Richard's musical interests include the realm of liturgy, which he has been able to pursue in his experience as a cantor.

STAFF INFORMATION

Christopher McGahan (Music Director)-After receiving his Master of Music degree under Robert Fountain at the U.W. Madison, McGahan earned a doctorate in conducting at the University of Illinois-UrbanalChampaign. He is presently Coordinator of Choral Activities at the University of Lowell, Massachusetts. With an orchestral and choral conducting career spanning more than 25 years, McGahan has also served as music consultant to WQED-TV, Pittsburgh, and is also arts advisor to various foundations. He continues to pursue research and study opportunities in the U.S. and Europe. McGahan has been on the conducting faculties of Beloit College, the University of Illinois and Bucknell University. Ruddypare is his 4th production as Music Director of the Madison Savoyards.

John Carle (Stage Director)-This is J.C.'s 4th production with the Madison Savoyards, either as "patter man" (the "Duke of Plaza Toro" in The Gondoliers and the "Lord Chancellor" in Iolanthe), stage director (Ruddyzare) or both (stage director and "Sir Joseph Porter" in H.M.S. Pinafare). The New York Times has cited him as "a master of the Gilbert and Sullivan comedic roles." When not in Madison, J.C. resides in Southampton, New York.

Vickic Burcham (Stage Manager)-After acting as Assistant Stage Manager for last year's production of Lolanthe, Vickie this year takes on the double roles of Stage Manager and Vice President of the Savoyards' Board of Directors (much to the consternation of her cats, Houdini and October). Vickie has performed in and/or stage managed numerous productions with Strollers and the Madison Theatre Guild.

Karen Brown-Larimore (Costume Designer)-This is Karen's third show with Savoyards. Her designs have been seen in many shows in the Madison area. Her favorites include Beauty and the Beast, Amadeus and The Merry Widow. When not designing in Madison, Karen makes her living touring with Broadway shows; she'll soon be leaving us to join her husband on the national tour of Les Miserables.

Jose Polansky (Props Dosigner)-Through his work with Madison Theatre Guild, CTM Productions, Repertory Theater, Madison Savoyards, Ltd., and other area groups, Jose has demonstrated his expertise both behind the scenes and onstage. This is his 4th production with Savoyards.

Dave Torney (Technical Director)-Dave's work was shown state-wide in the 1985 broadcast of Madison Savoyards, Ltd., production of The Gandaliers. His profession as a stage hand, designer and director takes him around the country. Dave has a long association with the Savoyards.

Mark Tulley (Set Designer/Graphic Artist)-Ruddygore marks the debut of Mark Tulley's work with Savoyards, in his dual role as Set Designer and Graphic Artist. Mark works throughout the area and is closely associated with the Baraboo Theater Guild.

Jan Gormican (Make-up Designer)-While audiences have enjoyed Jan's designs in many area productions, her closest association in recent years has been with CTM productions. Jan last worked with Madison Savoyards, Ltd., in the late 1970's.

Christopher Barker (Lighting Designer)-This production marks the 15th year of Christopher Barker's association with Savoyards, and his 4th as Lighting Designer. Past productions include H.M.S. Pinafore. The Pirates of Penzance and Iolanthe. Chris is an avid scuba diver, sailor and photographer.

Jennifer M. Dungan (Assistant Stage Manager)-Having recovered from a severe bout of theatre in 1986, Jenn is now suffering a relapse. She has considerable backstage stage management credits with the University Theatre, as well as stints with American Players Theatre and M.M. Colbert's Modern Ballet. Jenn's real interest, however, is play writing; she recently had her first play, Boxes, produced in workshop, and is always available to talk with potential producers.

Beth Ylvisaker (Rehearsal Accompanist)-Beth is currently working on a Master of Music degree in Piano Performance at the U.W. Madison. She is originally from Decorah, Iowa, and is a graduate of Luther College. Beth has no future plans at the moment, and is taking suggestions - could her debut with Savoyards hold strange portents for the years to come?

Perry Allaire (Principal Coach)-A native of Green Bay, Perry Allaire holds a Bachelor's Degree in Music from the U.W. Madison and a Master of Music, Vocal Performance, from the University of Michigan. He has lectured, taught and performed throughout the Madison area, singing principal roles in such U.W. Opera productions as Albert Herring and Midsummer Night's Dream. Perry is Choir Director at Holy Redeemer Church. He has a long and varied background with the Madison Savoyards, Ltd.

Richard Knowles (Producer)-Since 1974, Richard has served in Madison Savoyards, Ltd., as chorus member, principal singer, board member, president and producer. He is a professor of English at the U.W. Madison, and currently performs with such area groups as the U.W. Early Music Ensemble, the Schutz Ensemble and the U.W. Opera.
