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The Argument

The plot of Patience centers around Reginald Bunthome, a "fleshly poet", who is, as he himself puts it, an "æsthetic sham" who has enraptured the local ladies with his artistic pretensions. The play opens with these ladies, engaged to the officers of the 35th Dragoon Guards, screnading their idol. Bunthome, however, loves Patience, a naive milkmaid. Patience asks the maidens why love is so wonderful if all it does is make them miserable. Angela tells Patience that love is the only unselfish emotion and that "love tainted with selfishness is no love." Horrified that she has never experience this selfiess passion, Patience determines to go out and fall in love with someone before nightfall.

The Dragoons try to win the ladies back, but their pleas fall upon deaf ears. Meanwhile, Patience happens upon Archibald Grosvenor, an "idyllic poet" who has the misfortune to "be madly loved at first sight by every woman I come across." Archibald, who knew Patience as a child, says his child-love for her never faded. They vow to live and die together, but Patience realizes, to her horror, that, as Archibald is the embodiment of perfection, there can be nothing unselfish in loving him and that "to monopolize those features on which all women love to linger...would be unpardonable." Patience and Grosvenor decide to part forever.

Bunthorne, rejected by Patience, has decided to raffle himself off to one of the rapturous maidens when Patience enters and declares that since there can be nothing selfish in loving Bunthorne, she will consent to be his bride. The ladies all return to their former sweethearts, but the Dragoons' happiness is short-lived as Grosvenor enters and the maidens desert the Dragoons once again.

The second act opens with Jane who sings of her loyalty to Bunthorne while Grosvenor tries to convince the maidens that their love is hopeless since he still loves Patience. Bunthorne is already quite jealous over the way that Grosvenor has stolen the affections of the maidens, so when Patience declares that Grosvenor is "the noblest, purest, and most perfect being I have ever met," Bunthorne and Jane plot to rid themselves of Grosvenor. Bunthorne threatens to curse Grosvenor if he does not discard his æstheticism. Grosvenor says that he has long been looking for a good excuse to become commonplace and goes off, leaving Bunthorne to gloat over his victory.

The Dragoons return with the ladies who explain that if "Archiba.d the All-Right" chooses to discard æstheticism, æstheticism must be discarded by all. Patience, discovering that her Archibald is no longer perfect, premptly falls into his arms. Bunthorne, crushed, consents to marry his last remaining admirer – Jane. The Duke now enters to announce that, to be fair, he will wed the only maiden with the misfortune to be plain...Jane. She happily accepts the proposal and "nobody is Bunthorne's bride."



Director's Notes

The "aesthetic movement" which is the object of Gilbert and Sullivan's pointed satire in Patience, or Bunthorne's Bride proclaimed the virtues of pre-Raphaelite art – that is, early Renaissance art prior to the time of the painter Raphael. With its emphasis on classical, medieval, and other artistic styles to counter the stuffiness and excesses of Victorian England, the principles embodied in the works of William Morris, Dante Gabriel Rossetti, Algemon Swinborne and James McNeill Whistler were refreshing winds when they began to blow in the 1850's, but by 1881 when Patience was produced, these ideas had been transformed into a cult of exaggeration and extremes in poetry and painting, to say nothing of language and attire. It is this bubble of fashionable foolishness, epitomized by no one so much as Oscar Wilde, that Gilbert pierces so sharply, and it is a mindless devotion to faddishness, held up to ridicule, that makes the satire of this witty and ingratiating work not only enjoyable but relevant for audiences a hundred years after its creation.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to everyone whose energy and enthusiasm has made this production possible, but most especially to our wonderful cast.



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Cast Bios

Perry "Major" Allaire is a veteran of several Madison Savoyard productions. His major roles have included Sir Despard in Ruddygore ('78), Willis in Iolanthe ('79), King Hildebrand in Ida ('80) and Samuel in Pirates ('81). For the 1989 production of Ruddygore, Perry was the vocal coach for the principles. Perry has sung leading roles with UW Opera and has staged and sung Gilbert and Sullivan, along with other composers, in such disparate places as the Ethical Society of Philadelphia and the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

Brian "Duke" Femrite last appeared with the Savoyards as Earl Tolloller in Iolanthe (88). A locally based singer/actor, Brian received a BA in Theatre and Music from Luther College. While attending Luther, Brian twice won the NATS Competitions. After College, he performed with the Music of the Baroque Chorus in Chicago under Tom Wickman. Brian has also performed in Madison Opera and CTM shows such as Beauty and the Beast, Carousel, Narnia, Babar and Oliver. Brian is currently studying voice with Kitt Foss.

Terry "Lady Jane" Kiss Frank has the remarkable distinction of being both a cast member and a staff member. As there is more room in the staff section, her bio is included there.

Deanna "Lady Ella" Gibeau is a student of Mimmi Fulmer at the UW-Madison. Deanna made her debut with the Madison Savoyards in 1988 when she played Fleta in Iolanthe. She played Despina in last year's University Opera production of Cosi Fan Tutte, and is looking forward to her role as Gretel in Opera for the Young's Hansel and Gretel. Deanna is presently co-music director and soprano for the Madison Arts Players.

John "Colonel" Hyland is not only in his fourth year performing with the Madison Savoyards, but also his third year as president of the Savoyard's Board of Directors. Some of John's previous Savoyard roles have been Sir Despard in Ruddygore ('89) and Pooh-Bah in Mikado ('90). He has an extensive theatrical background including Gilbert and Sullivan experience with the Starlight Theatre in Rockford where he appeared in both Pirates and Pinafore. John is an attorney with the firm of Hurley, Burish and Milliken, S.C.


Sam "Grosvenor" Hutchison is a graduate of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey where he received his degree in church music and organ performance with honors. He has concertized extensively in the US and in Europe having performed recitals in many of the major cathedrals including St. Paul's in London and Notre Dame in Paris. In 1985 he performed the complete organ works of J. S. Bach in a series of eleven weekly recitals in observance of the 300th anniversary of the composer's birth. Currently Sam serves as organist at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Madison.

Bill "Bunthorne" Lutes, a self-professed aesthetic sham, is best known to Madisonians as classical music host and producer of Wisconsin Public Radio. A native Kentuckian, he holds degrees in piano from the Universities of Kentucky and Wisconsin as well as the Artist's Diploma from the New England Conservatory. Although this is Bill's first role with Savoyards, he is no stranger to G&S having performed the role of Lord Chancellor with the Victorian Lyric Opera of Washington, D.C. and Sir Joseph Porter with Lexington Musical Theatre in Kentucky. He has directed Gondoliers and taught a course on G&S for the Smithsonian Institution's Resident Associates Program.

Megan "Lady Saphir" O'Leary began her career in theater at the age of ten in the Madison Opera production of Baby Doe. Since then, she has appeared in many Madison productions, both as dancer and singer. Most recently she performed in Song of Norway as the Prima ballerina Adelina. Other performances include Liesl in The Sound of Music, Gloria Rasputin in Bye, Bye Birdie, Snowflake and Chinese Girl in Nutcracker, and a soloist in The Messiah.

Lisa "Lady Angela" Reichl is now involved with her fifth consecutive Savoyard production. Lisa portrayed Kate in Pirates ('87), Iolanthe in Iolanthe ('88) and Ruth in Ruddygore ('89). She was also the Assistant Musical Director in both Ruddygore and Mikado ('90). Lisa received her Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1989. She currently resides in Waukesha and serves as choral director at Kettle Moraine Middle School.

Cindy "Patience" Weaver is a newcomer to the Madison area having just moved from Sycamore, IL in August of 1990. She holds a Bachelor of Music – Vocal Performance degree from Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington and has done graduate work at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb. Cindy is presently working toward a Master of Music degree at UW-Madison, after which she hopes to pursue a performance/teaching career. Patience is Cindy's first production with the Savoyards.

Terry Kiss Frank is delighted to be both staff and cast for Patience, having previously performed such roles as Phoebe in Yeoman ('84), The Duchess of Plaza Toro in Gondoliers ('85), Buttercup in Pinafore ('86), Ruth in Pirates ('87), the Fairy Queen in Iolanthe ('88), Dame Hannah in Ruddygore ('89) and Katisha in Mikado ('90). She recently had an opportunity to reprise her role as Ruth for the 1991 Opera for the Young state school tour. Terry is continuing her work with that worthy organization as Production Coordinator for their 1992 project. Her work with CTM Productions has been both on stage-in Oklahoma!, Godspell, Babar and Anne of Green Gables-and off-she directed music for the 1986, '87, '88, '89 and '90 productions of A Christmas Carol. Along with working in the theater, Terry serves as Director of Music at Memorial United Church of Christ and as "The Voice" (female version) of WISC-TV 3. She continues her community involvement with her position as President of the Board of Directors of the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra.

Scott "It's a Girl" MacPherson is currently on the faculty of the UW-Madison School of Music, where he conducts the Chamber Singers and the Madrigal Singers, and teaches choral conducting and choral literature. In addition to a three year appointment at the UW from 1985-1988, Scott has also taught choral music at the high school level in Salt Lake City, Utah and Verona, Wisconsin. Scott has extensive experience in musical theater and opera, including productions with the Wisconsin Youth Theater, the Salt Lake City Youth Theater, the Song of Norway Festival, and the 1988 Madison Savoyards' production of Iolanthe. He holds the MM degree in choral and orchestral conduction from the UW-Madison and is currently a dissertator for the DMA in choral music from the University of Southern California

Michael Goldberg is no stranger to the Madison Savoyards. His past directing experience with the group includes Iolanthe ('79), Pirates ('81), Mikado ('83), Gondoliers ('85), and The Zoo ('84). Michael's professional experience includes both commercial and non-profit performing arts presenting, management and administration. He lives in Cross Plains with his wife, mezzo-soprano Allisanne Apple, their wonderful daughter Amalia and their two dogs, Fat Dylan and Dumb Melba. Michael is Director of the Wisconsin Union Theater.

Randy "Call and raise a nickel" Meder is two semesters away from completing his undergraduate degree in Choral Music Education. He is currently studying voice with David Hottmann at the UW-Madison. Randy is also the music director and choir conductor at Salem United Church of Christ in Verona, Wisconsin.

Kim "What's my motivation" O'Brien is new to the Savoyards, but not to the theater. She has a Bachelor's degree in Music and Dance from Ripon College and a Master's degree in Choreography from the University of Northern Colorado. Kim is the President of the Madison Theatre Guild's Board of Directors and has choreographed, directed and performed in shows for both the Theater Guild and Sun Prairie Civic Theater. Patience will be the 37th show that Kim has choreographed.

Joan Capelle is involved in her first Savoyards' production. In the seven years since she moved to Madison, she has acted and stage managed for the Oregon Straw Hat Players and Strollers, where her latest roles were Cat in All Hallows Moon and Charlotte in In a Northern Landscape. Joan has stage managed numerous shows for both groups. Between shows she X-rays horses and cows at the UW-Vet School and tries to spend time with Molly and Scamas.

Terri Scheel is yet another newcomer to the Savoyards. Terri's theatrical experience includes stage management, props, and lighting for the Madison Theater Guild as well as serving as treasurer for the same group. She has also appeared on stage in MTG's Play It Again, Sam as well as Oakwood Encore 1990 and Sun Prairie Civic Theater's The Man Who Came to Dinner. In her spare time, Terri runs the business office for a Madison psychological clinic.

Janalynn "Stand up straight or I'll put you in a corset" Winke's first costume design experience was as a student in Illinois when she designed the hats for her High School's production of The Music Man.
