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

The Argument

Trial by Jury

Edwin, tiring of his sweetheart Angelina, falls in love with another; and Angelina accordingly halls him into court for breach of promise. At the rise of the curtain the Usher, while requesting impartiality from the Jurymen, shows a definite partiality himself for the fair Plaintiff. Edwin explains that he simply happened to fall in love with another girl. Though both Jury and Judge indicate that they have similar episodes in their own past, they have little sympathy for him.

After the Jury is sworn in, Angelina appears and immediately captivates all the men present. Her lawyer gives a stirring speech, and she falls sobbing on his breast. Edwin proposes various solutions, but in vain. He offers to marry her if he may marry his other sweetheart later, but Angelina's lawyer objects. Edwin tries to dissuade her from wanting to marry him at all, saying that when he is drunk, he would beat her. The Judge proposes that Edwin be made drunk to see whether he would, but the lawyer once again objects.

Finally, the Judge, disgusted at the objections and eager to get away, marries Angelina himself.

The Sorcerer

Alexis, son of Sir Marmaduke, and Aline, daughter of Lady Sangazure, are happily betrothed. Hoping to share their good fortune with all of the village (most especially with their parents, who are spouseless), they obtain a love potion from J. Wellington Wells (of J. Wells & Co, Family Sorcerers). Dr Daly, village Vicar, unknowingly incants the spell as he brews tea for the betrothal feast.

Alas, as is the case with spells, this one goes away in that all the wrong people fall in love with each other (including Aline!). In order to break the spell, a sacrifice in necessary, and Mr Wells is impressed upon to perform this noble duty.

Cast Bios

This summer's production marks Elliot Friedman (Council for Plaintiff)'s Savoyard debut, and it is now clear that his previous experience as a paralegal was merely an extended rehearsal for his role as Counsel for the Plaintiff. Elliot is currently working on his doctorate in Psychology and hopes to finish this work within the next year. During the academic year he keeps his musical hand in as a regular with UW Madrigal Singers.

David Gagnon (Alexis) was last seen with the Madison Savoyards in their Production of *The Mikado*. He has also appeared with Madison Opera as Hortensio in *Kits Me Kate* and with UW opera as Tony in *West Side Story*. Other roles include Gaston in *La Traviata*, Colin in *Le Devin du Village*, Reverend Paris in *The Crucible*, Maitre 'd in *She Lover Me* and Mr. Tumnis in *Normia*. David is currently pursuing a masters degree in voice at the UW-Madison and is a student of Lois Fisher.

Deanna Gibeau (Aline) performed previously with the Savoyards in Patience, and Iolanthe. She also sang in a program of selected Gilbert and Sullivan music on Wisconsin Public Radio's "Live from the Elvejbern." Her roles with UW-Madison Opera include Silberklang in Der Schauspieldirektor and Despina in Cost fan Tutte. She performed as Gretel in Opera for the Young's Hansel and Gretel, travelling to 40 Wisconsin schools, as well as the Green Lake Music Festival this year. Her work with Great Lakes Opera of Milwaukee includes Sister Catherine in Dialogues of the Carmelites. Deanna is particularly interested in the music of Brazil, and gave a recent program dedicated to Brazilian Song. Deanna has studied voice with Mimmi Fulmer and Kitt Reuter-Foss.

This is Peter Gibeau (Notary)'s second production with the Madison Savoyards, having been a Heavy Dragoon in last year's Patience. He has been involved with G&S productions elsewhere: as a senior at Oberlin, he revived the Oberlin Gilbert & Sullivan Players and was the music director for three productions (including Trial). He has also played the roles of the Sergeant of Police (Pirates), Lord Montarrarrat (Iolanthe), Pish-tush (Mikado), and Sir Marmaduke (Sorcerer). In real life, Peter just completed his Ph.D. in Music Theory at UW-Madison and will be moving to West Bend to join the faculty of the UW Center-Washington County.

Judd Harmon (Foreman) has sung with the Savoyards for just over a decade, with principal roles in a number of productions. He is currently the treasurer of the Madison Savoyards Board of Directors. A Minnesota native, he has been employed as an educator in Wisconsin since 1966 and has worked at the Wisconsin Department for Public Instruction since 1976.

Stephen Hurley (Counsel for the Defendant) is one of Madison's 50,000 lawyers and could very well pass for 43 in the dusk with a light behind him.

John Hyland (Judge, Mr Wells), a Madison attorney with Hurley, Burish & Milliken, has enjoyed performing with the Savoyards over the last 5 years. His roles have included Colonel Calverley in last year's Patience, and Pooh-Bah in The Mikado. John especially enjoys his role in Trial, in which he gets to keep one of his bosses from speaking. This is John's fourth year as president of the Board of Directors.

This is John Kruse (Usher, Sir Marmaduke)'s seventh Savoyards production. He specializes in bass pomposity (The Grand Inquisitor, Dick Deadeye, The Mikado). He also has appeared with Children's Theater of Madison in "friendlier" roles (Tevye, Professor Digory, and the spirit of Christmas Present). He serves on the Madison Savoyards Board of Directors and sings in the Choral Union. John is married to Ginny Moore Kruse, father of three daughters, and pastor of Calvary United Methodist Church in Madison.

Tamara Norden (Constance) returns to the Savoyards in the role of Constance, having appeared last in the 1988 production of Iolanthe. With the help of scholarships won as Wisconsin's Junior Miss of 1986, Ms. Norden graduated in 1991 with a BA in music, political science, and women's studies. She appeared in UW-Madison productions such as Into the Woods, They're Playing Our Song, Transformations, The Crucible, and Jerry's Girls. She also has been active in CTM productions, appearing as Mole in Wind in the Willows and working backstage on A Christmas Carol and The Travels of Babar. Ms Norden in currently an Associate Editor at the Center on Education and Work at UW-Madison and anticipates pursuing and interdisciplinary graduate degree combining music and women's studies in 1993.

A self-described "reformed instrumentalist," Kathy Otterson (Mrs Partlett) spent ten years teaching elementary band before returning to the UW in 1989 to pursue vocal/choral studies. She is currently a student of Prof. Ilona Kombrink and will begin work on a Master's Degree in Voice Performance this fall. This appearance marks her first venture out from the orchestra pit and onto the Savoyard's stage. When not warbling in a practice room or rehearsal hall, Kathy enjoys Ukranian egg decoration, cooking, and golf.

Anne Seaton (Plaintiff) received her undergrad degree in voice performance from the Ohio State University. But her heart belongs in Wisconsin. Since the start of her studies here at UW-Madison she has performed with the UW Opera several times and also with Madison Theatre Guild. Savoyards has given Anne the opportunity to do what she enjoys the best - sing sing sing.

Carol Louise Senn (Lady Sangazure)'s first taste of Gilbert and Sullivan came in 1984 when she played Tessa in *The Gondoliers* with the Greenville Savoyards in South Carolina. Since then, she has been a true G&S fan, both directing and singing in four productions at Maranathe Collage in Watertown where she is on the Fine Arts Faculty (director of *Pirates* and *Mikado*, director and the Fairy Queen in *Iolanthe*, director and the Duchess in *The Gondoliers*). Carol Louise also sang in the chorus with the Madison Savoyards 1987 production of *Iolanthe*. She is choir director and organist at Fellowship Baptist Church in Watertown.

John Webber (Defendant, Dr Daly) is a resource teacher for gifted and talented in Waunakee. Since his debut as a sailor on H.M.S. Pinafore 40 years ago, he has sung most of the tenor roles in Gilbert and Sullivan, including Captain Corcoran and The Defendant with Madison Savoyards. John has performed with the Madison Symphony and Opera, the UW-Madison, Mt. Horeb's Song of Norway and many other groups in this area.

Staff Bios

A member of the UW History faculty since 1962, specializing in Byzantine and Medieval Mediterranean History, with side fields in the relationship of music and the arts to general cultural history, John Barker is also a music buff, amateur musicologist, music journalist, and fervent record collector. He conducts a weekly program, "Recent Recordings", for station WERN, and edits (and largely writes) The UW Opera Prompter for the campus opera productions. Unable to recall a time when he was not a G&S fan, he has been an active Savoyard for a dozen years, for much of that time a member of the Board, sometime Producer, chorus member, & founder and editor of the quarterly newsletter, Savoyardage. This is his first full venture into stage directing.

Tim Hedgepeth received his BA in speech and drama from Trinity University and an MFA in direction from UW-Madison Department of Theatre and Drama where he staged The Marriage of Bette and Boo, The Miss Firecracker Contest, Jerry's Girls and Starting Here, Starting Now. Other credits include, The Abduction of Europa, First the Music, Then the Words, and The Impressario for UW Opera; Broadway Bound and Sweet Charity for the Madison Theatre Guild. Tim has written theatre reviews for The Capital Times, Isthmus and Manhattan Arts and film and video critiques for the Dallas Observer. In August Tim will be moving to Charleston, SC. He is very happy that his Madison "Swan song" is with the Savoyards.

For the first time in 9 years, Terry Klss Frank is confining all of her work with Savoyards to the offstage arena. "I knew with Susan [Gustaf] travelling, my jobs as costume chair and Production Coordinator would be much more than full-time ... but I look forward to being onstage again next year!" Terry also serves on the Board of Directors for Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra and is Music Director at Memorial United Church of Christ.

Scott MacPherson is currently a Visiting Assistant Professor on the faculty of the UW-Madison School of Music, where he conducts the Chamber Singers and the Madrigal Singers, and teaches choral conducting and choral literature. In addition to a three year appointment on the same faculty from 1985-88, Scott has also taught choral music at high schools in Salt Lake City, Utah and Verona, Wisconsin. He is also the director of the First Congregational Church Chancel Choir in Madison. Dr. MacPherson has extensive experience in musical theater and opera, including previous productions with the Madison Savoyards (Patience, 1991 and Iolanthe, 1988), the Wisconsin Youth Theater, the Salt Lake City Youth Theater, the Song of Norway Festival, and the UW-Madison Opera. He holds a DMA in choral music from the University of Southern California and a MM in choral and orchestral conducting from the UW-Madison.

In a Galaxy Far, Far Away...(Somewhere to the left of Andromeda)...a young lad discovered the wonder and magic of Theater Lighting. He was so enchanted with the beauty and majesty of theater that he became the inspired genius known throughout the galaxy as the Illuminator. This, though, is not the story of Chris Barker. Chris has been designing lighting for several Madison groups over the past 10 years. In this time he has created lighting for productions with the Madison Theater Guild, Strollers Theatre, Broom Street Theatre, and Synergy. Trial and Sorcerer mark the seventh Gilbert and Sullivan production Chris has lit for the Madison Savoyards. Previous G&S credits include Mikoslo, Pirates, and last years production of Patience

After her day job, Maxine Boyce is often found working during rehearsals and backstage with Madison Theatre Guild, Stroller's Theatre, Ltd. and Waunakee Players. This is her first year with Savoyards.

Susan Gustaf returns to Savoyards after a histus of several years during which time she was based in Reno, Nevada. Audiences will remember her creations from 1984's Yeoman of the Guard and 1985's The Gondollers, among others. Susan recently toured to Singapore in her second year with Phontom of the Opera. This summer finds her involved in productions in Door County as well.

Jose Polansky has demonstrated his expertise both behind the scenes and onstage through his work with Madison Theatre Guild, CTM Productions, Repertory Theatre, Madison Savoyards, and other area groups. This marks Jose's seventh production with Savoyards.

This is Terri Scheel's second year with the Savoyards, she was ASM for last year's production of Patience. She has worked both backstage and on stage with several theatre groups including Wisconsin Dance Ensemble, Strollers Theatre, Madison Theatre Guild, CTM, Sun Prairie Civic Theatre. After her day job as business administrator for a mental health clinic, Terri is enjoying hanging out with the Savoyards gang again this year.

David Torney's profession as a stage hand, designer and director has taken him around the country. In 1985, Dave's work was shown state-wide when the Savoyard's production of Gondoliers was broadcast. His responsibilities include both design and construction of the set.
