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

Argument

Date: Between 1700 and 1882

Act I - An Arcadian Landscape

Twenty-five years before the setting of the opera, Iolanthe, a fairy, had committed the capital offense of marrying a mortal. The Queen of the Fairies had commuted the sentence to lifelong exile on condition that Iolanthe leave her husband and never see him again.

Her son, Strephon, has grown up as a shepherd, half-fairy, half-mortal. Strephon loves Phyllis, a ward of the Court of Chancery. She loves Strephon but is unaware of his mixed origin. Meanwhile, the entire House of Lords is enamored of Phyllis, especially the Lord Chancellor, her guardian.

At the start of the opera, the fairies persuade the Queen to pardon Iolanthe, and she returns, introducing Strephon to her sisters. The Queen agrees to help when Strephon announces that he wishes to marry Phyllis despite the Lord Chancellor's refusal.

The House of Lords enter and appeal to the Lord Chancellor to give her to whichever peer she chooses. Phyllis enters and declines to marry a peer, announcing her intention to marry Strephon. The peers angrily refuse and leave, taking Phyllis with them. Iolanthe enters and holds a tender conversation with her son. But, as she (like all fairies) looks like a girl of seventeen, Phyllis and the peers misinterpret the scene. They do not believe Strephon is being faithful and Phyllis decides to marry one of two peers, Mountararat or Tolloller.

The fairies take revenge by sending Strephon to Parliament and casting a spell to make all the peers pass any bills that Strephon chooses including entry depending on intelligence rather than class. The peers are terrified and appeal to the fairies not to carry this out but they refuse, so all angrily spurn each other.

Act II - Palace Yard, Westminster

The peers are upset about Strephon's success in Parliament and appeal to the fairies to return things to normal. One of the lords sings in explanation. The fairies would like to oblige, as they have fallen in love with the peers themselves, but it is too late to stop Strephon. The Queen is shocked by the fairies' feminine weakness and, while acknowledging the affect on her of a nearby sentry, asserts that she remains strong.

Tolloller and Mountararat discover that if either marries Phyllis, by family tradition they must duel to the death. Both then renounce Phyllis in the name of friendship. Meanwhile, the Lord Chancellor has had a sleepless night and eventually decides to marry Phyllis himself.

Strephon confesses to Phyllis that he is half a fairy and they decide to marry as soon as possible. They persuade Iolanthe to appeal to the Lord Chancellor on their behalf and she does so, revealing that she is his wife.

Thus she again incurs the death penalty. Meanwhile, the other fairles have married the other peers, so all should die. The Lord Chancellor suggests that by adding the word 'not' to the fairy law, the fairles would not have to die. To save her life, the Queen marries Private Willis, all the mortals are transformed into fairles and they all fly away to Fairyland, leaving the House of Lords to be filled according to intelligence not birth.

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Artistic Director's Program Notes

"The quintessence of Gilbert and Sullivan is that they can be both ridiculous and intelligent at the same time." - Leslie Bailey, Gilbert & Sullivan: Their Lives and Times

Nothing evokes the spirit of late Victorian England so vividly as a Gilbert and Sullivan opera (the term both men preferred to operetta). The enchanting music and sparkling dialogue seem as fresh and delightful as they did two (I) centuries ago. While the irascible Gilbert reveled in the caustic wit and the topsy-turvy humor of his extremely lucrative collaborations with "the English Mendelssohn," Sullivan spent most of his life fretting over the possibility that (as Queen Victoria herself had suggested) he was squandering his creative gifts on such trivial and frivolous, though enormously profitable, endeavors.

Composer and author were both collectors. They gathered subjects, styles and ideas from throughout the vast Empire and the world in true 19th century British fashion. From Kyoto to Kensington, from Wagner to Westminster, anything was fair game for Gilbert's acerbic humor and Sullivan's musical imagination. Their works bear the stamp of unmistakable genius and of a uniquely Victorian sensibility so confident in itself and its pre-eminence that it could be made the butt of the most biting satire.

In theatrical and in sheer mercenary terms, the G&S phenomenon also epitomized its time. With the help of the formidable businessman and producer Richard D'Oyly Carte, Gilbert and Sullivan created an enterprise that continued to amass performances, profits and praise from around the world long after the passing of its creators.

Jolanthe satirizes a well-ordered universe where the forbidden intermarriage between Arcadian-based Fairydom and the House of Lords "strikes at the root of the whole fairy system." The fruit of such a union is a Parliamentary shepherd who is "a fairy down to the waist, but whose legs are mortal." Such antic schizophrenia treats rather lightly a number of fundamental Victorian conflicts that often set rational idealism and prudish morality against brutal industrialization, worldwide imperialism and a sometimes thinly veiled lasciviousness. But "the subtleties of the legal mind are equal to the emergency," and "an old Equity draughtsman," by the insertion of a single word, is able to reconcile these conflicting worlds. It probably delighted Sigmund Freud.

Gilbert and Sullivan's enduring legacy of music and laughter, so uniquely the product of its times, with its contradictions thus conjoined, continues to cheer delight audiences of today.



Artistic Staff Profiles

Michael Goldberg (Artistic Director), a UW-Madison graduate, has worked in performing arts management, administration and programming in Washington, DC, New York and Wisconsin for over thirty years. He has been the Director of the Wisconsin Union Theater since 1980.

Michael has directed for the UW Opera, Madison Phi Beta, Madison Savoyards and others. His opera credits include Les Mamelles de Tiresias (Poulenc), Riders to the Sea (Vaughn-Williams), The Medium (Menotti), There and Back (Hindemith), The Human Voice (Poulenc) and La Cenerentola (Rossini). His Gilbert and Sullivan directing includes The Pirates of Penzance, The Mikado, The Gondoliers, Cox and Box and The Zoo (Sullivan).

Of his musical tastes, he spent his high school years as a standee at the old Metropolitan Opera House. He learned the words to most of the Rodgers and Hammerstein musicals while working at a carnival for two summers where the public address system blared out show tunes day and night. He has loved G&S with a passion after two years in the Peace Corps in Africa, where the only musical theater available was a weekly sing-along to an old, beat-up record player and some scratchy excerpts of Patience, The Mikado and Iolanthe. Other personal favorites include Gordon Lightfoot, The Grateful Dead and the inimitable Jussi Björling. Michael has dedicated his work on this production of Iolanthe to the memory of David Lewis Crosby.

Gary McKercher (Music Director/Conductor) came to Wisconsin after more than twenty years experience in college and university choral conducting, holding such positions in Nebraska, California and Kentucky. Choirs under his direction were regularly recognized by ACDA and MENC professional organizations, and he has been active as a guest clinician and conductor across the country.

Gary holds advanced degrees in choral music from University of Southern California (DMA) and California State University-Fullerton (MA). His Bachelor of Arts degree was earned at Luther College. Gary has completed post-doctoral study at the American Conservatory in Fontainebleau, France. His mentors have included Rodney Eichenberger, Howard Swan and Weston Noble.

Gary has conducted over forty choral/orchestral works including Bach's Christmas Oratorio, Handel's Messiah, Haydn's Creation, Elgar's The Dream of Gerontius, Brahms' A German Requiem and Naenie, Purcell's Fairie Queen and Stravinsky's Mass. Gary has been engaged by the Savoyards for recent productions of Princess Ida and A Dickens of a Christmas.

Sandi Walker (Choreographer), new to Madison, has already performed and choreographed for Kanopy Dance Company, Madison Dance and Fitness, and Connolly Dance Company. She teaches dance to people with disabilities through Very Special Arts of Wisconsin. Sandi's Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Dance was earned at North Carolina School of the Arts. She directed her own not-for-profit dance company in Atlanta as well as a children's dance company. She has taught dance to students ranging from three to eighty years old.

When not dancing, Sandi is a mom, an occupation that combines her theater, music and dance training plus old methods of employment food service, counseling and patience working in a hospital. Andrew and Dad are energetic and fun people – and very supportive of Mom's talents!

Perry Allaire (Assistant Music Director) took advantage of the opportunity to step in for Music Director Gary McKercher during some necessary absences by the latter during *Iolanthe* rehearsals. Perry is currently choir director at Holy Redeemer Catholic Church where they try to present one choral setting of the Latin Mass every year.

He prepared the chorus for a performance of Mozart's Requiem at the Banff Center in Banff, Alberta, Canada and prepared the chorus for Haydn's Creation at St. Paul's University Catholic Center during which he sang the parts of both Raphael and Adam. Perry holds a Bachelor of Music degree from UW-Madison and a Master of Music degree from the University of Michigan.


Dramatis Personae



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
